Leaving Certificate Applied

Key points

- The Leaving Certificate Applied is a two-year Leaving Certificate.
- Available to students who wish to follow a practical programme with a strong vocational emphasis.
- It is designed for those students <u>who do not</u> wish to proceed directly to third level education
- or for those whose needs, aspirations and aptitudes are not adequately catered for by the traditional Leaving Certificate.

What is LCA?

• The fundamental goal of the L.C.A. is to prepare students for transition from the world of school to that of adult and working life.

- > Work Experience
- Active and practical learning experiences
- > Continuous assessment
- **>** Regular reporting from the SEC
- >Less emphasis on final examinations



A range of courses are provided within each of these subjects

- The subjects that can be studied for LCA can be divided into three main areas:
- General Education subjects
- Vocational Preparation subjects
- Vocational Education subjects

These are inter-related and interdependent.

General Education subjects

(All students study the following subjects)

- Social Education
- Arts Education
- Gaeilge Chumarsáideach
- Modern language
- Leisure and Recreation

Students are required to take courses in each of the following areas:

. Vocational Preparation subjects

- . Vocational Preparation & Guidance
- . English and Communication

Vocational Education subjects

Mathematical Applications

Introduction to Information & Communication Technology

Vocational Specialism – 2 courses

Students must complete 2 full courses, from the list below.

- With regard to the vocational specialism, the list of options is as follows
- Childcare/Community Care
- Graphics and Construction Studies
- Craft and Design
- Engineering
- Information and Communication Technology
- Hair and Beauty
- Horticulture/ Agriculture



Assessment and Certification in LCA

How is LCA assessed?

The Leaving Certificate Applied is assessed in a variety of ways including interviews, orals, written and practical work.

Students can gain up to a maximum of 200 credits over the course of the two years.

Students are also required to have 90% attendance.

Students earn credits for:

• Completing coursework for their modules or *Key Assignments*

- Seven projects or Student Tasks
- Seven Final Exams

<u>1.90% attendance and all key assignments</u> <u>complete</u>

Divided into 4 different blocks called Sessions:

Session 1: September 5th Year – January 5th Year
 Session 2: February 5th Year – June 5th year
 Session 3: September 6th Year – January 6th Year
 Session 4: February 6th Year – May 6th Year

62 Credits

Key Assignments must be completed in all subjects across each Session

>90% attendance in each subject

Module Completion

- At the end of each Session (term) the student will be credited on satisfactory completion of the appropriate modules.
- In order to be awarded credit students must:
- (a) attend the classes and out-of-school activities related to the modules and
- (b) complete the key assignments related to the module.

Student Tasks

As part of the Leaving Certificate Applied students undertake a number of tasks. These are set and examined over the two years of the programme. These tasks, are; practical activities, which allow students, individually or in teams, to apply classroom experience to real-life situations.

External Examinations

At the end of Year 2 students will take written examinations in the following areas:

- English and Communication
- Vocational Specialisms (2)
- Mathematical Applications
- . Gaeilge
- Modern European Language
- Social Education

LCA Certification

Certification awarded at 3 levels

PASS	120 - 139 credits	60-69%
MERIT	140 - 169 credits	70-84%
DISTINCTION	170 - 200 credits	85-100%

Students who acquire less than 120 credits or who leave the programme early will receive a "Record of Experience".

Work experience in LCA:

>4 unique Work Placements across the 2 years – 1 day per week


> Students find these themselves

Students attend *Preparation for the World of Work* class once a week

>Spot visits occur each week

Students must contact their employer and the LCA Coordinator if they cannot attend Work Experience (it is still a school day!)



- Sessions The two years of the Leaving Certificate Applied are broken down into FOUR sessions. September — January and February — June in both years.
- Credits Students accumulate credits throughout the two years with up to two-thirds being 'banked' before the final exams at the end of 6th year. The maximum number of credits that a student can gain is 200.
- Work Experience This is integral to the LCA programme. Students are given the skills and confidence to access up to four different work experiences throughout the two years of the programme.
- Tasks These are significant pieces of work that the students take part in throughout the two years, there are seven in all accounting for just over one third of the total credits.
- Specialisms These are vocational areas of study that help the students develop specific skills and knowledge relevant to a range of careers. Students choose two of these to study from a choice of eleven.
